What Will 2019 Bring?

It seems like only yesterday that Hurricane Michael slammed into Mexico Beach with maximum sustained winds of 160 miles per hour, becoming the third most intense storm to hit the U.S. in recorded history. Tropical-storm-force winds stretched for more than 320 miles across Florida's panhandle on October 10, 2018, and in the hardest-hit areas the devastation is still readily apparent.

Michael's lasting impacts are a stark reminder that hurricane preparation is incredibly important. Talquin is making preparations for the 2019 hurricane season, and we encourage our Members to do so as well. It is never too early to gather essential supplies and to make a plan should you and your family need to evacuate to a safe area away from a storm.

Tips to Prepare for Hurricane Season

Here are things that you can do to prepare for the 2019 storm season:

- Start to gather bottled water, non-perishable foods, first aid supplies, clothing and bedding, and other emergency supplies. Store items in easy-to-carry containers which can be moved in the event of a storm emergency.
- Make a checklist of the things you will need in the event of an evacuation for you and your family, so that nothing essential will be left behind during a rushed departure.
- Cut down on wind hazards by removing any diseased and damaged limbs from trees.
- Limit flooding by making sure there is no debris in storm drains or clogged ditches. Report issues to the proper authorities.

By starting now, you can avoid the rush at home supply stores, grocery stores, and other venues that are typically crowded and often chaotic when hurricane watches and warnings are issued. Planning for a hurricane may be hard to imagine right now while the weather is good. However, the threat is just around the corner. Hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30, so do not get caught without a plan – gather important materials and prepare now for whatever may come our way this year.

Co-ops Raise Concerns about Proposed Reregulation Amendment with Florida Supreme Court

Recently, the electric cooperatives in Florida teamed up to raise concerns about a proposed amendment to Florida's Constitution that would have immediate and far-reaching impacts on cooperatives and their Members.

Here at Talquin Electric Cooperative (Talquin), we are proud of the safe, reliable and affordable service we provide to our Members. We proudly provide electric and water services to more than 44,000 Members within the counties of Gadsden, Leon, Liberty, and Wakulla. Serving our Members has been our mission for the last 80 years and will continue to be our top priority for the next 80 years to come.

But our ability to continue this level of quality service to our Members will change if the Constitution is amended to reregulate the energy industry.

The proposed amendment, which is titled "Right to Competitive Energy Market for Customers of Investor-Owned Utilities; Allowing Energy Choice," is currently under review by the Florida Supreme Court to determine its validity to appear on the ballot in November 2020.

The Florida Electric Cooperatives Association (FECA), on behalf of Talquin, 14 other electric distribution cooperatives, and two generation and transmission cooperatives, filed a brief on April 18 with the Florida Supreme Court. This brief expresses concerns associated with the proposed amendment and how the proposed amendment will impact our Members.

FECA's brief demonstrates that the ballot summary of the proposed amendment misleads voters. The brief states that the ballot summary attempts to dupe voters into believing that cooperatives are not affected. In fact, if passed in 2020, the amendment would have immediate and far-reaching impacts on all Florida electric cooperatives and their Members.

Other parties who filed in opposition to the amendment included: other electric utilities, trade associations, environmental groups, cities, counties, the Florida House and Senate, and Florida's Attorney General.

The responsibility of the Florida Supreme Court is to review a proposed Constitutional amendment and ensure that the amendment meets the requirements by law before being placed on the ballot for the voters to consider.

DAMAGE TO YOUR HOME'S SERVICE CONNECTION

Steps to restore power if your home's service connection is damaged.

1

Know what you need to repair

- Homeowner's own and are responsible for electrical equipment attached to the house (service stack, attachment hardware, riser and meter box) and the pole with an attached meter box for mobile or manufactured homes.
- If the homeowner's equipment is damaged, repairs will be needed before Talquin can connect service.

2

Seek a licensed electrician

- Do not hire an unlicensed electrician. It could create safety hazards and possibly delay your power from being connected.

3

Do not attempt to fix the damage yourself

- It could create safety hazards and possibly delay your power from being connected.

4

Make sure repairs pass required county inspections*

*Check with your county for inspection requirements related to storm damage.

5

Notify Talquin at 1-888-802-1832 when you are able to receive power.

- Ensure all of the steps above are complete and you are safely able to receive power.

Safe Generator Operation

Electric generators can keep your lights and appliances running during power outages — but they can also pose serious safety hazards if operated incorrectly. To ensure the safety of your family, neighbors and Talquin employees, please read and follow the safety, maintenance and testing instructions in the generator's operating manual.

- o Use heavy-duty extension cords to connect electric appliances to the outlet on the generator. Check for damage to cords and make sure to watch for trip hazards.
- o Do not overload the generator. It should be used only when necessary, and only to power essential equipment.
- o Never run an electric generator inside a building. Always ensure proper ventilation and airflow around the generator. The carbon monoxide generated is deadly.
- o Start the generator before connecting appliances.
- o Never add fuel to a generator while it is running. Avoid spilling fuel on hot components.
- o Always have a fully charged, approved fire extinguisher located near the generator.
- o Keep children away from the generator at all times.




Plug appliances directly into the generator itself. Connecting the generator directly to your home's circuits or wiring must be performed by a qualified, licensed electrician who will install a transfer switch that will keep the generator from feeding power back into the distribution lines. If that happens, the power crews working to restore your electric service could be put at risk. Also, if your generator is still hooked up when the power is restored, your generator and your household electrical system may be damaged.

If you are interested in a GenerLink transfer switch, contact a Member Service Office to arrange purchase and installation of a unit for your home.



Checking Breakers

During a power outage, do not forget to check your breakers. Remember, some locations have an outside breaker box near the meter. When breakers trip, they are usually in the middle position, so you will need to reset it by flipping off and then flipping back on.



Using Your Water Meter to Check for Leaks

The best way to determine if you have a leak in your plumbing system is by first checking your water meter. Water meters are generally located near the edge of your property near the road.

1. Make sure **NO** water is being used inside or outside of your house.
2. Locate your water meter.
3. Take a meter reading and wait 1 or 2 hours and take another meter reading (make sure no water is used during this time). If the reading has changed, you have a leak.

After you have determined that you have a leak, the next step is to determine if the leak is inside or outside of your house.

1. Locate your home's main shut off valve and shut off the water at the valve. Typically, you will find the shut off valve in the basement or garage directly behind an outdoor faucet, or outside below an outdoor faucet. *Not all homes have a shutoff valve and Talquin will not be able to determine if you do have one.*
2. Again, use the meter reading method as stated above, making sure not to use any water during this period. If there is a change in the meter readings, the leak is outside between the meter and the house.

For leaks inside the home, look for leaking faucets and toilets, as these are the two most common causes. For leaks outdoors, look for spots in your yard that are always wet or dark spots in your concrete driveway. If you are unable to locate the leak, you may need to call a plumber.

Once a leak is located, water needs to be shut off to your property while repairs are being made. You can do so via the shut off valve located at the meter. If you are unable to find the meter and/or shut off valve, you can call a Talquin Member Service office at 850-627-7651 for assistance.

Apricot-Basil Chicken Salad

Ingredients:

1/3 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup low-fat Greek yogurt
1 garlic clove, minced
5 teaspoons champagne or white-wine vinegar
1/2 teaspoon paprika
3 cups shredded cooked chicken
1/4 cup blanched slivered almonds, toasted
1/2 medium white onion, minced (1/2 cup)
1 large celery stalk, diced small (1/2 cup), plus leaves
1/3 cup packed fresh basil leaves, torn
1/3 cup dried apricots, diced small
Coarse salt & ground pepper



1. In a large bowl, whisk together mayonnaise, yogurt, garlic, paprika, and vinegar. Stir in chicken, almonds, onion, celery, apricots, and basil.
2. Season with salt and pepper. Can be an appetizer, topped on crackers or toasted bread.

White-Bean Salad with Zucchini and Parmesan

Ingredients:

2 cans (15 1/2 ounces each) cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
3/4 lb zucchini (about 2 small), trimmed, quartered lengthwise, and thinly sliced on the diagonal
4 ounces green beans, trimmed and thinly sliced on the diagonal (3/4 cup)
2 ounces fresh Parmesan cheese, crumbled (1/2 cup)
1/2 cup fresh basil leaves, torn
Grated zest and juice of 2 lemons
1 tablespoon olive oil
Coarse salt and ground pepper



1. In a medium bowl, place cannellini beans, zucchini, green beans, Parmesan, basil, lemon zest and juice, and oil; season with salt and pepper. Toss to combine.

During hurricane season, your grocery list should include water, non-perishable foods and other supplies you may need if you evacuate or stay home during a storm. Here are just a few of the items you need to keep on your list:

- Water: 1 gallon per day, per person
- Canned goods: fruit, vegetables, juice, soups, meats, pasta, beans
- Nuts
- Peanut butter
- Granola/energy bars
- Bread/crackers
- Seasoning
- Condiments: single serve size that you do not refrigerate
- Pet food: do not forget about your pets!
- Manual can opener
- Paper goods: plates, cups, & utensils
- Grill/charcoal/propane
- Lighter/lighter fluid

Powering Up After an Outage


When the power goes out, we expect it to be restored within a few hours. But when a major storm or natural disaster causes widespread damage, extended outages may result. Our line crews work long, hard hours to restore service safely to the greatest number of Members in the shortest time possible. Here's what's going on if you find yourself in the dark:

1. High-Voltage Transmission Lines:

Transmission towers and cables that supply power to transmission substations (and thousands of members) rarely fail. But when damaged, these facilities must be repaired before other parts of the system can operate.



2. Distribution Substation:

A substation can serve hundreds or thousands of consumers. When a major outage occurs, line crews inspect substations to determine if problems stem from transmission lines feeding into the substation, the substation itself or if problems exist further down the line.

3. Main Distribution Lines:

If the problem cannot be isolated at a distribution substation, distribution lines are checked. These lines carry power to large groups of consumers in communities or housing developments.



4. Tap Lines:

If local outages persist, supply lines (also known as tap lines) are inspected. These lines deliver power to transformers, either mounted on poles or placed on pads for underground service, outside businesses, schools and homes.



5. Individual Homes:

If your home remains without power, the service line between a transformer and your residence may need to be repaired. Always call to report an outage to help line crews isolate a local issue.
