Talquin Strong!

We celebrated Talquin's 82nd Annual Meeting on Saturday, April 30. Congratulations to David Wright (District 2), Carla Pararo (District 5), and Clifford Bristol (District 8) for being elected to serve another term as a Trustee of Talquin!

The leadership of Talquin's Trustees has never been more important than it is right now. As we continue to move into our new normal coming out of the pandemic, many of our challenges are evolving into unprecedented changes

that we must adapt to – and Talquin is no doubt seeing the impacts. These changes include sharp increases in the cost of natural gas, one of the primary sources of fuel for electricity generation, as well as supply chain issues that are causing delays in obtaining materials and equipment we need to operate. However, your Cooperative has overcome many obstacles in the past.

In the last decade, Talquin has been challenged by storms, security threats, and a difficult labor market. Despite these challenges, we have added significant tools to improve our Member experience, including the ability to report outages via

text message; the addition of an outage map on our website with information and approximate restoration times; and a mobile app for easy bill payment, outage reporting, notifications, and usage tracking. Through our Member surveys and other metrics, we continue to see approval ratings of about 90%, showing just how capable and resilient your Cooperative really is.

Additionally, Talquin has added several systems to improve process efficiencies and reduce costs, such as:

- Automated meter reading to improve billing accuracy and reduce outage times;
- An internal, wireless communications system to keep Talquin's resources working efficiently during major events;
- Advanced communications and control infrastructure for remote facilities (i.e. substations and well sites); and
- A vehicle location system to allow our operations center to locate and dispatch resources more efficiently.

Security concerns have also been prominent topics for Talquin over the past ten years. Cyber security attacks are on the rise, highlighting the need to have prevention and continuity responses as a top priority, as your Cooperative has been doing for many years. In addition to proactively implementing systems to prevent these attacks, we continually train employees on best practices and have penetration tests and security audits performed regularly by third parties. We will continue to place the safety and security of our employees, Members, and utility assets at the top of our priority list.

So, we are happy to report that Talquin, just as we have with challenges over the last decade, remains strong and focused on our primary mission – to enhance and maintain the quality of life in the community we serve by providing safe, reliable, and affordable utilities – during our current challenges.

Finally, we would like to thank Talquin's Members for continuing to support your Cooperative and for participating in this year's Trustee elections and Annual Meeting!




Congratulations to each student who was chosen and participated in the competition. These future leaders are truly amazing and are all great representatives of their schools, Talquin, and the state of Florida!



Summer Dinner Recipe

Easy Grilled Shrimp Boil

Prep Time: 15 minutes (+10 minutes wait time)

Cook Time: 20 minutes **Yield:** 4-6 servings

Ingredients:

1 lb. raw tiger prawns (or jumbo shrimp), peeled and deveined 2 tablespoons Old Bay seasoning, divided

2 medium ears of corn, husks removed and cut crosswise into 2-inch slices 10 baby potatoes, halved 2-3 sausages, sliced
1 lemon, quartered
5 cloves garlic, crushed
¼ cup melted butter, divided
3 teaspoons parsley, freshly chopped, divided
1 tablespoon olive oil



How to Make:

- 1. In a medium bowl, combine prawns and 1 tablespoon Old Bay seasoning. Let it sit for 5 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine corn, baby potatoes, sausage, lemon and garlic. Add in the seasoned shrimp. Add 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 teaspoon parsley, and remaining tablespoon of old bay seasoning. Toss together and let it sit for 10 minutes.
- 3. You can grill these on either a grill pan or an outdoor barbecue grill.

To cook on a grill pan: Brush grill with olive oil and heat on medium-high heat. Add items on the grill, and gently brush the remaining butter on top. Grill for 5 minutes until you see some distinct grill marks. Then, reduce heat to medium, flip the items over, and add 1 cup of water. Cover with aluminum foil, and simmer for 15 minutes.

To cook on barbecue grill: Brush grill with olive oil or spray with cooking spray. Add items on the grill, and grill for a few minutes until you see some distinct grill marks. Remove items from the grill, and place into a large disposable aluminum tin, add in remaining butter, and cover with aluminum foil and seal the edges. (OR: Divide onto four 12-inch sheets of aluminum foil. Divide the remaining butter amongst them. Fold over to create a pocket and roll up the edges to seal.) Place aluminum pan or foil packets on the grill and cook for 15-20 minutes until cooked through.

Serve with remaining chopped parsley on top and Old Bay seasoning.
