

Principle #1: Voluntary and Open Membership

Cooperatives are voluntary organizations, open to all people able to use its services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.



To Talquin, a Member is a Member, no matter the location, size or length of membership. We value each and every one of our Members and can never express how much we appreciate the outpouring of love and support shown to our employees and those that came to assist during Hurricane Irma.

2. Democratic Member Control

Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. Elected representatives (directors/trustees) are elected from among the membership and are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote); cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

Expanding Renewable Energy Generation

Please notify Talquin of self-owned renewable energy generation

Per Florida statute (366.91), the State of Florida requires that Talquin and all other electric cooperatives within the state file an annual report with the Public Service Commission that details the amount of electricity received via customer-owned alternative energy sources, such as residential solar panel installations. At present, Talquin Electric has 93 Members who own renewable systems that generate electricity for their homes and businesses. These systems generate electricity for personal use, and excess power is returned to Talquin's system for distribution to its other Members. The co-op records, using a special meter, the amount of electricity returned to the co-op's system.

If you own or plan to have one of these systems installed, please make sure you have signed an interconnection agreement with Talquin Electric. The State of Florida requires that all customers who have systems that are or will be connected to the electrical grid have an interconnection agreement signed with the receiving utility. The Member is responsible for notifying Talquin that they are operating or plan to operate one of these alternative energy systems. This notification is important for safety reasons, billing purposes, and ensuring the Member receives proper credit for putting power back into the co-op's distribution system.

What is Net Metering?

"Net Metering" means the difference in the amount of energy supplied by Talquin Electric Cooperative to a facility less the amount of energy generated by the individual Member that is delivered to Talquin's system.

When a Member's power system generates more energy in a month than the Member uses, Talquin provides a credit for the excess energy. The credits are carried forward to the next month's billing. At the end of the calendar year, Talquin trues up any remaining credit on an account. The remaining credit is either paid out or provided as a dollar amount credit on the first billing of the new year, in accordance with Talquin's tariff.

What is required to sign up for Net Metering?

The Member or the Member's contractor will need to supply:

- ☐ a signed Interconnection Agreement
- ☐ a copy of Personal Injury & Property Damage Liability Insurance
 - ≤ 10kW requires \$100,000
 - > 10kW and ≤ 100kW requires \$1,000,000
 - >100kW and ≤ 1,000kW requires \$2,000,000

- ☐ Net Metering does not apply for generation units larger than 1,000 kW
- a "one-line" diagram of electrical connections
- \Box a county inspection
- a manual disconnect switch between the inverter and the home's electrical panel

Once Talquin has received this information and verified the facility meets all requirements, Talquin will provide a net meter at the location and set the account up for net meter billing.

3. Members' Economic Participation

Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital remains the common property of the cooperative. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative; setting up reserves; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.

Did You Know? Unclaimed Capital Credits

If any Member or former Member fails to claim any check representing the retirement of capital credits within two years after payment has been attempted, such failure shall constitute an irrevocable contribution by the patron to the cooperative. This contribution is invested back into items such as mainte-

nance and improvements to cooperative infrastructure.

Parmesan-Crusted Green Beans

These green bean "fries" are nearly addictive as a snack or served along with sandwiches. Kids love them with creamy low-fat dressing as a dip.

Total Time: 30 minutes

Servings: 4

1 pound green beans, trimmed

2 eggs

1 cup milk

1 cup flour

2 cups bread crumbs

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

2 teaspoons garlic powder

2 teaspoons onion powder

2 teaspoons oregano, dried

3 tablespoons lemon zest (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In a medium stockpot, bring 3 inches of salted water to a boil. Add the green beans and cook for 3 minutes, remove from heat, drain and immerse in cold water to cool. Drain and set aside. In a small bowl, combine the breadcrumbs, Parmesan cheese and oregano with the onion and garlic powders.

In a wide bottom bowl, blend together the eggs and milk. Place half the flour on a wide plate, and half the bread crumbs on another plate. Working in small batches, place green beans in the flour and coat well. Remove the beans from the flour, shaking off any excess, and place them into the egg wash and coat well. Use a pair of tongs to remove the beans from the egg wash and place into the breadcrumb mixture. Coat



well with bread crumbs and place the coated beans onto a large baking sheet in a single layer. Repeat the steps with the remaining beans.

Bake the beans for 18-20 minutes until crisp, remove from the oven and serve, garnished with fresh lemon zest.


